Trust Resources Are At Risk

California is a renowned leader in transparency laws, but lawyers are taking advantage of asbestos victims by gaming the system and draining resources for future victims.

Many of those harmed by asbestos are veterans. If asbestos trust funds are depleted, **veterans will be hurt the most.**

A recent court ruling has increased the number of victims eligible to file claims for asbestos exposure. Current practices are draining finite resources for all people harmed by asbestos, and without transparency, people impacted in the future could be **left with nothing.**

AB 1056 Protects Veterans Exposed to Asbestos

AB 1056 (Kiley) will provide the needed transparency and fairness to protect veterans and every person harmed by asbestos with an emphasis on availability of assets for current and future claims.

California is home to roughly 2 million veterans, more than any other state in the nation.

Trust claims must be protected to ensure compensation is available for all victims, not for double-dipping lawyers who game the system to garner larger fees.
